Exposure to Contaminated Drinking Water at Camp Lejeune

In the early 1980s, at Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune, NC, it was discovered that two on-base water-supply systems were contaminated with the volatile organic compounds trichloroethylene (TCE), a metal degreaser, and perchloroethylene (PCE), a dry cleaning agent. Benzene, vinyl chloride, and other compounds were also found to be contaminating the water-supply systems. The water systems were contaminated from August 1953 through December 1987.

Although there is conflicting scientific evidence regarding long-term health effects of potential exposure, there is limited or suggestive evidence of an association between certain diseases, particularly kidney diseases/cancer and leukemias/lymphomas, and the chemical compounds found at Camp Lejeune during the period of contamination. VA considers disability compensation claims based on exposure to the contaminated water at Camp Lejeune on a case-by-case basis, with deference to medical opinions provided by experts in environmental medicine.



Requirements for Service Connection

- You must be a Veteran who was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable
- You must have served at Camp Lejeune during the period of contamination (August 1953 through 1987)
- You must have a current disease and a medical opinion that states the disease is at least as likely as not due to exposure to the contaminated water at Camp Lejeune

Claims based on exposure to the contaminants at Camp Lejeune have been consolidated to our regional office in Louisville, KY. This was done to ensure that claims based on exposure are processed by employees who know the history of the water contamination, and who are committed to ensuring that each Veteran's claim is fully developed for information concerning length of duty at Camp Lejeune, and where the Veteran lived and worked. Normally, VA will request a VA medical examination and an opinion regarding the relationship of the disease to service at Camp Lejeune. The Veteran's claims file is made available to the subject matter expert (SME) in the Veterans Health Administration who is asked to provide the opinion. The SME reviews all available evidence concerning the claimant's service at Camp Lejeune, as well as family history and exposures prior to and post-service, and all scientific and medical literature related to the particular claimed disabilities, and renders an opinion that is consistent with the Veteran's exposure.

VBA Actions to Date

To ensure consistent and accurate decisions for Camp Lejeune Veterans, VBA has taken the following steps:

- Issued a training letter on environmental exposures on April 26, 2010;
- Consolidated processing of Camp Lejeune claims to the Louisville Regional Office and provided specific training to personnel in Louisville in December 2010. The average days to process these claims has fallen from 337 days in September 2011 to 285 days at the end of 2014:
- Provided a letter to regional offices establishing policies in January 2011;
- Reviewed prior Camp Lejeune associated claims in January 2011:
- Established a decision indicator to track these claims in February 2011;
- Issued a Camp Lejeune training letter on April 27, 2011 (revised November 29, 2011);
 and
- Continues to meet regularly with the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry's Community Assistance Panel.

Camp Lejeune Claims – Update – April 2015

Statistics (as of February 28, 2015)

A total of 9,636 Veterans have received a decision on a claim related to exposure to contaminated water at Camp Lejeune, as outlined in the table below. Of the 9,636 decisions, 778 were granted and 8,909 were denied. VBA has granted 1,226 Camp Lejeune-related issues and denied 21,650 issues that were claimed to be related Camp Lejeune. However, it is important to note that 5,819 of the 9,636 Veterans are currently receiving VA benefits (63.2%) for EHCL and/or non-EHCL disabilities.

A breakdown of the EHCL decisions by condition (i.e., issue) is provided in the table that follows according to disease category. Nine of the disease categories in the table were identified in the National Research Council report. An additional four diseases are included in the table as they are known potential associations with the contaminants involved. The grant rate for those thirteen disease categories is 14.1%. The majority of granted issues are related to Bladder Cancers.



Claim issues are denied when there is no credible medical opinion establishing a link between exposure to the contaminants and subsequent development of the claimed disability. This is reflected most in the 17,186 miscellaneous conditions that have been denied. In each of these, there was no or insufficient medical evidence establishing that it was at least as likely as not that the condition was associated with exposure to the contaminants in the water.

Please note that this information does not reflect the number of unique Veterans who have received decisions. Rather, it reflects the number of individual medical issues decided, as Veterans may submit claims for multiple issues. A total of 12,894 claims have been decided, and 3,831 Camp Lejeune claims are currently pending.
